# Biology Excursion Year 11 LongNeck Lagoon Biology excursion

On August 8th and 9th, the Year 11 Biology classes participated in an excursion to Longneck Lagoon at Scheyville National Park to study the effects of the environment on the Green and Golden Bell Frog. Longneck Lagoon is a thriving wetland habitat characterised by freshwater reed beds and diverse aquatic vegetation. The wetland is surrounded by lush bushland and woodland, contributing to a diverse ecosystem comprising both aquatic and terrestrial environments.




The green and golden bell frog, also named the green bell frog, green and golden swamp frog and green frog, is a species of ground-dwelling tree frog native to eastern Australia.

During the excursion, students conducted various experiments in the terrestrial environment, including testing soil pH, soil temperature, light intensity, air moisture, and leaf litter density.

For instance, leaf litter density was measured to determine the amount of carbon, nitrates, and other nutrients re-entering the soil. In the aquatic environment, students assessed parameters such as salinity levels, temperature, pH, biological indicators, and ammonia levels. For example, biological indicators were tested to evaluate the health of the aquatic ecosystem and to check for the presence of predatory fish.

Students investigated the interrelationships of organisms with their environment and experimented range of fieldwork methodologies, for their term 3 excursion based of module 2 and 3.

Two activities of your choice for three months and one for six, while you complete your adventurous journey over three days camping in the bush.

Recently, students participating in the bronze level adventurous journey, set off to Upper Colo to take part in their three-day hike up the mountain range. Across grueling tracks and steep hills, the students participating took part in new experiences away from the confines of their phones. This allowed them to flourish in the bush as they learned new things such as navigating, building tents and many more, to build their survival skills. I, myself took part in this journey. 


# Ponds Sport Carnival The Pond athletics carnival + the LEO's Club


