She said being in a small group was amazing and was especially proud that students sung our Anthem. A meaningful ceremony was organised by Ms Caramancion, Mr Sikahele and assisted by Ms Tidmarsh. Attendance

The Ponds High School Plan, 2021-2024 has specific attendance targets. For parents it is not what the targets are but why the targets are that matter. In this newsletter is the advice on attendance for parents is included. This advice stresses that realisation that attendance every day is important! On hot days, cold days, windy days, rainy days, last day of term days and sports carnival days and the day-after-a-big-family-event days. As parents we directly and indirectly influence and shape our children's attitudes towards school and learning.

Extracts from the *Education Act 1990* state that it is the duty of the parent of a child of compulsory schoolage to cause the child: to be enrolled at, and to attend, a government school or a registered non-government school.

If a student misses as little as 8 days in a school term, by the end of primary school they'll have missed over a year of school. All students who are enrolled at school, regardless of their age, are expected to attend that school whenever instruction is provided.

Parents are required to explain the absences of their children from school promptly and within seven days to the school. An explanation for absence must be provided to the school within 7 days of the first day of any period of absence.

It is acknowledged that in the time of COVID we all have been asked to remain away if we have a sniffle so as not to spread any germs, to wash our hands and remain a safe distance from those who have a cold.

It is understood that this will interfere with our attendance data in a negative way, but the ban on international travel has a positive impact on attendance data as families remain in Australia to celebrate holidays.

5 Reasons why you should come to school every day

- 1. Learning takes place every day at school. (Just think of the advantage of a Year 11 public school student who attends to 17 December compared to other systems that break up on early December..... 14 more days learning!)
- 2. Interaction with other people increases our social skills, cements relationships and learning. Developing the ability to think and feel with and alongside others.
- 3. Catching up on missed learning is more difficult and needs to be achieved in isolation.
- 4. Routines are good for all of us. Get into class by the end of the song!
- 5. Knowing what you do and do not want to know... testing it out and eliminating the things you don't want to do "When you grow up".

NSW student attendance data in 2020 is not comparable to previous years due to the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic. The NSW Government encouraged students to learn from home, where possible, for a seven week period from 24 March to 22 May. During this period, schools monitored engagement with learning to determine whether students were marked present. This changed the attendance measure. There was also some evidence of varied marking practices as schools adjusted to the learning from home period, with some schools recording higher attendance rates while others recording markedly lower rates.

Look at the following lyrics and reflect on what you want your children to be. For me it was about keeping doors open and giving them opportunities. My boys did sport, dancing, musicals, clubs, leadership, more sport, Boys' group at CHHS and more. I believe regular attendance made them more knowledgeable, more resilient, more connected, more brave, better friends and better people.

Here is my challenge to all parents. Next time your child says "I can't go to school today.." think of 5 reasons to say no unless they are genuinely ill.



On Tuesday, April 27, The Ponds High School Open Boys Knockout Cricket team played against Parramatta High School in round 3 of the Alan Davidson Shield.



AUSTRALIAN OPEN KARATE COMPETITION

Treative Writing Workshop

Characterisation, Plot & Setting

Blacktown City Council Library recently provided The Ponds High School with a free Creative Writing Workshop with the prolific and well-known author, Pamela Freeman, who also writes as Pamela Hart.

Ms Freeman explained the importance of developing characters, setting, and plot well before an author even begins writing a story and she provided some strategies to help student writers with this process. As a group, students came up with a range of intriguing characters, compelling plot events and settings on Earth and beyond and then, via a 12-sided die, the stories started coming together.

Freeman spoke about her 'apprenticeship' in writing through her role writing for ABC Kids and she encouraged students to write regularly and often to develop their craft.



A few students in the group are writers of fanfiction and Freeman explained that she too, was a fanfiction writer and that also helped her hone her writing skills.

A big thank you to Blacktown City Council Libraries, and Pamela Freeman for providing the workshop and an even bigger thank you to the students who attended, for their engagement and contributions.





Zine Making

During Term 1, Makers Hub (lunch time on Tuesdays) students embarked on zine making. We used A3 sheets of paper and with a few folds and a few cuts turned each sheet of paper into an 8-page zine. Students were free to choose the contents of their zines – some chose to illustrate, find images, collage photographs, and they also wrote short articles. Each student should be proud of their planning and creativity.

This term, Makers Hub is focused on the natural environment with some nature journaling. Students will be encouraged to notice their environment and take records of what is happening in the natural world. Pocket sized sketch paper, and materials will be provided.

Poetry Competition

Red Room Poetry in collaboration with The Australian Botanic Garden in Mount Annan introduces the Poem Forest Prize. Students are invited to write a poem inspired by the natural environment using words for positive climate action.
