Choice Theory / Reality Therapy – Teacher Professional Learning

This training provides staff with strategies to better understand student behaviour and counsel students to better manage their own behaviours and choices they make. The training will be offered to more staff in 2021 and beyond.

National Sorry Day

Wednesday 26 May marked <u>National Sorry Day</u> (part of National Reconciliation Week), a very important day for us as a nation and as a school. This is a day for recognising the impact that some past practices have had on our First Nation families.

A key part of reconciliation is acknowledging the role our institutions have played throughout history. The history of education in NSW is one to be proud of, but it is important that while maintaining that pride, we acknowledge mistakes we have made and the lessons we have learned.

Until as recently as 1972, official policies and practices of excluding Aboriginal students meant many were denied the education all other children in NSW were entitled to. We recognise that the impact of these practices has rippled through generations. While policies have changed, there is still work to do to ensure all students have access to quality education.

It is both a big responsibility and an enormous privilege to be improving Aboriginal education outcomes while supporting a connection to culture. The Department of Education is working on the Premier's priority to increase the number of Aboriginal young people reaching their learning potential and is committed to increasing the proportion of Aboriginal students attaining Year 12 accreditation.

One of the most rewarding and exciting things about working in education is its ability to open doors and improve life opportunities for our students.



Bicycles and Scooters



Recently, additional bike and scooter racks have been installed to accommodate the increasing number of students riding and scooting to and from school.

A reminder to students and parents about the safe and responsible use of bicycles and scooters. Students must ride their bicycles and scooters safely to and from school, ensure they wear helmets and abide by traffic rules. Students are also reminded that they are not to ride their bicycles or scooters on school grounds and not to travel through Riverbank Public School.

Below are some tips for (students and parents) travel to and from school which are taken directly from the NSW Department of Education website.

Be alert and aware

Take note of the dangers you come across on your walk/ride to and from school; dangers, such as vehicles coming out of driveways. Be alert in a road environment.

Choose a safe crossing

Choose a safe place to cross the road.

Stop, Look, Listen, and Think every time you cross the road

Discuss this important road safety message.

STOP! take one step back from the kerb. LOOK! continuously both ways.

LISTEN! for the sounds of approaching traffic. THINK! whether it is safe to cross.

For more information, refer to the department's pedestrian safety advice for students, parents and carers. Students who drive to school are reminded to drive with care and consideration with regards to pedestrians, other drivers and our community members at all times. Similarly, it is expected that if/when students are in the community ie. shops, they are to behave in a manner that is befitting of 'PONDS PRIDE'.

Sick Bay

Parents are advised that in the case of students needing assistance in Sick Bay, parents may be called in the event that a student is too sick or injured to remain at school. It would be of great assistance if parents, relatives or emergency contacts are available to attend to students who need to be picked up.

Uniform and Lateness

Students are reminded that they are expected to arrive to school in time to attend Roll Call at 8.30am. Students who arrive late need to present a note written and signed by a parent/carer to the office to explain the student's lateness. Similarly, it is expected that students attend school each day in the correct uniform (including correct shoes and hats). PE uniform is only permitted for Years 8, 9 and 10 on Sport days (Wednesday). It has been very pleasing to see that the majority of students are always in the correct uniform, and students are ensuring that they are wearing the correct shoes (lace up, black, hard leather). Parents/carers will be contacted in the event that their child is persistently late to school or out of uniform.



Student Wellbeing

Our Student Wellbeing Team works tirelessly to support students' learning and wellbeing needs. Students and parents are encouraged to make contact with Year Advisers or Stage Head Teachers as the initial points of contact for student wellbeing matters. Students can self-refer to the School Counsellor should they require further assistance. Students or parents should contact our Head Teachers Wellbeing should they have any general Wellbeing enquiries, or our Learning and Support Team for any Learning and Support enquiries. Our Head Teacher Wellbeing (Engagement) and Careers Advisors can offer support for students wishing to pursue alternate pathways in education or work. If a student has a KLA (subject)-specific query, these enquiries should be directed to the relevant subject Head Teacher. The Deputy Principals are also available to field enquiries related to teaching, learning, wellbeing and general school-wide matters.



The 5Ps – 'Prompt, Prepared, Positive, Polite, Productive' are key values that staff and students are encouraged to foster and abide by. These values build the basis for a positive and productive school environment and are also the cornerstones of our society and the expectations of employers.

The 5Ps also extend to the notion of 'PONDS PRIDE', which is based on respecting others, our school and our community. We remind our students to demonstrate respect, courtesy and 'PONDS PRIDE' in the community at all times. We encourage all students to take pride in our school and our local community.

An example of PONDS pride was on display during the recent Zone Cross Country Carnival where a nearby school called to say one of our students stopped to assist a student from their school when they fell during the race, forfeiting their position and finishing 9th. Our student then sought out the other school student after the race to check on him. Thank you and well done!



Assessments

In Term 1, students were issued with diaries, planners and Assessment Schedules. All students are encouraged to regularly refer to their schedule in order to better plan and prepare for assessment tasks. Students are encouraged to ask their teacher for additional assistance and/or attend Homework Club on Tuesday,



Wednesday and Thursday afternoons (3.00pm – 4.00pm) to assist with homework, revision and/or completing assessment tasks. Students are also encouraged to begin revision or work on assessment tasks early, plan their time effectively and refer to marking criteria to maximise their performance in assessment tasks. *'Failing to Prepare is Preparing to Fail'*

As part of being 'prepared', students are encouraged to use their diaries to note key dates, events and assessments. Teachers may write comments in students' diaries which parents/carers can check.

Course Requirements

Students are reminded to ensure that they are completing all coursework and assessments with sustained effort and diligence. In cases where this is not occurring, students and their parents/carers will be notified in the form of warning letters which may lead to an N-determination in one or more courses which may affect a student's RoSA and/or educational progression.

Assessments and Misadventure

Any absence from an assessment task or late submission of a task (with a valid reason) requires the completion and submission of an Assessment Misadventure form. These forms are available from the Students Window at the Front Office and must be submitted to the relevant Head Teacher (with an accompanying medical certificate for Stages 4 and 5, or Stage 6 Assessment booklet documentation) within 5 days of the original due date.

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NOTE TO PARENTS

EARLY LEAVERS

Students who need to leave early **must follow the procedures below:**

1. **Bring a note from parent/guardian and take it to the Students Window BEFORE SCHOOL**. They will be entered on the Attendance System before 9.30am. Teachers will see they are an Early Leaver when marking their role. This will ease the telephone congestion as we have 2,000 students.

2. Ask the teacher politely if they may leave class at the designated time.

3. Report to the Front Office Students Window and collect their printed Early Leaver Slip.

4. Keep the Early Leaver Slip with them in case they are questioned by Police as evidence that they have permission to be absent from school.

Appointments should be made (where possible) **outside of school hours.**

STUDENT ABSENCES

Dear Parent/Carers,

When your child is absent from school you need to notify us in one of the following ways:

1. Send a reply SMS to the SMS that we have sent to you.

2. Telephone the school Front Office on 9626 3562 and notify the Front Office Attendance Staff.

3. Send an email to the school's email address: theponds-h.school@det.nsw.edu.au

4. On the day following the absence, send a note in with your child so they can place it into the 'Absentee Notes & Medical Certificates' box in the Front Office. It is a requirement that a medical certificate accompanies the note if the absence is due to illness and the leave extends beyond 5 school days.

Always put the reason as to why your child has been absent from school.

The Department of Education requires an Application for Leave Form if the student is away for more than 10 school days. This application form is available from student reception and must be submitted prior to the leave being taken. This can include family holidays, religious events or family issues.
