Year 12 2023

The first day of Term 4 (Monday 10 October) marks the beginning of the HSC course for our incumbent Year 12 students. Students will begin the term with an intensive Study Skills course which will assist students manage their time, study and wellbeing. Students will gain valuable skills and advice to support them through their final year of high school.

Yearly Examinations

Yearly Examinations for Years 7 - 10 will be held during Weeks 3 & 4 in Term 4. All students are encouraged to develop and implement an organised study and revision schedule, discuss any queries with their teachers, attend Homework Club, and give themselves ample time to plan and prepare for all tasks and examinations.

Uniform

Term 4 means the warmer weather is upon us, therefore, students are to wear their (correct) summer uniform. A reminder to all students that PE uniform is only to be worn for PE lessons and on Wednesdays for Sport (Years 8 - 10). Towards the end of Term 3, parents/caregivers were sent an email reminding students of the uniform requirements and that parents/caregivers of students who are blatantly or persistently out of uniform will be contacted to support the school in having their child attend school each day in the correct uniform. Non-TPHS jumpers, pants, shorts, or shirts are not accepted, nor are hoodies. A reminder that our uniform supplier is Cowan & Lewis. Parents or students who may require support with uniform are welcome to contact the school for assistance. Correct uniform fosters a sense of school pride and identity and provides safety for the ease of identifying our students both at school and in the community.

Assessments

Students are reminded that all assessment tasks must be submitted by the designated date and time. Students must apply to the Head Teacher of the relevant subject if they wish to apply for an extension or are sick or unable to submit a task by the due date. This requires an 'Illness and Misadventure' form to be completed and submitted to the relevant Head Teacher on the first day of the student's return.

school improvements

Additional shade is scheduled to be installed during the upcoming school holidays. This will provide students with more shade and shelter from the rain. The grassed areas have also been top dressed and fertilised to provide the best possible grass cover over Spring/Term 4. In addition to the COLA which now provides students with a sheltered space for basketball and other similar activities, planning is underway for additional shelter and further improvements to the physical space of the school for the comfort (and learning) of our students.

safe travel to and from school

Students are reminded to please be careful when traveling to and from school; particularly students who travel using bicycles or scooters. Please be mindful of pedestrians, cars and be careful when crossing roads (take care when crossing at intersections or pedestrian crossings). Parents are also reminded to please be mindful of no stopping zones, pedestrians and buses when dropping off/picking up students. The safety of our students and our school community members is of paramount importance.





school buses and bus passes

Students are reminded to please tap on/off (with their Opal cards) whenever using school buses. This provides Busways with accurate data in order to provide our school with the appropriate number of buses and services. Accurate numbers and appropriate bus services are not possible if all students who travel by bus do not tap on/off. Applications for bus passes can be made via the Opal website.

Keeping safe around school crossings

At all crossings you must wait on the footpath, at least one step back from the edge of the road. ere's a School Crossing Supervisor, wait until they stopped the traffic and called you to cros



If you are driving, you must not proceed until the School Crossing Supervisor's hand-held sign is no longer displayed, or until the crossing supervisor indicates that you may proceed through the crossing

When 'Children Crossing' flags are displayed, you must stop at the white line if pedestrians are waitin to cross. Divers must remain stationary until the crossing is clear of pedestrians.

Road safety Your guide to driving and

parking safely near schools The beginning and end of the school day are busy times for pedestrians and vehicles outside the school.

- u need to take extra care in 40km/h school zo
- Park safely and legally, even if it means walking further to the school gate Parking signs are planned with children's safety in mind.
- Slow down to 40km/h in the school zone and stay aware of crossings.
- · Always park and turn legally around the school
- Never double park as it puts children at risk
- · Manoeuvres such as U-turns and three-point turns are dangerous
- · Never park in a bus zone or in the school bus bay.
- Make sure your children use the Safety Door (rear footpath side door) to get in and out of the car.
- At a supervised crossing, observe the directions of the school crossing supervisor.
- · Model safe and considerate behaviour for your child they will learn from you

Remember to always give way to pedestrians particularly when entering and leaving driveways. Don't park across the school driveway or the entrance to the school car park. It's always a good idea to use the drop off and pick up area suggested by your school. This will help keep all children as safe as possible during the busiest times of

WEARING THE CORRECT UNIFORM

We are seeing more and more students wearing incorrect school uniform which we need to address. Next year we will have over 2000 students on our site, and we need to be able to identify our students on the grounds.

The issues we are having are:

Students wearing sports uniform on days when it is not a sports day

Students wearing hoodies of various colours (when hoods are worn up over the head, we cannot see faces) Students wearing incorrect jumpers with t-shirts beneath or even nothing underneath

Students wearing jumpers or t-shirts with slogans across the front

We have a uniform for many reasons including to identify our students. This assists us with security at school as we can identify anyone who should not be on our premises and keep our students safe. Our community can also identify our students on their way to and from school.

We do understand that students may tell parents they are allowed to wear other items, but we would ask that you check with the school before accepting this. Our school uniform is clearly shown on the "Cowan & Lewis" school uniform shop website.

To help us keep our students safe on our premises, from the start of Term 4, anyone out of uniform will be required to go home and change before returning to school.

We will contact parents to arrange pick-up of your child or allow them to walk home if that is how they travel daily.

Please also note that uniform notes stating that uniform is in the wash are not acceptable. Uniform can be washed by the student and hung to dry overnight and will be wearable the next day. Any students out of uniform for this matter lead to other students assuming they are also allowed to wear their own clothing.

We would be grateful for parental support with this issue.

HIGH SCHOOL

In NSW public schools students are expected to:

FORGOTTEN ITEMS AT HOME

We do not send items to class or call for students to come to the Front Office to collect forgotten items - as sending message disrupts the classroom learning.

Building Resilience and Independence

Last week a teacher reported that her class had been interrupted 6 times in one lesson of 55 minutes for students receiving forgotten lunches, pencil cases, sports uniforms, and homework.

While it is very nice that parents are prepared to support their children with their missing and forgotten items, the message is that students do not have to think for themselves.

Clearly, this interrupts learning and is not the best use of the Front Office staff's time. For this reason, we request that you encourage independence and support the school in following up on consequences.

This means only bringing emergency items such as medication to the School Front Office.

Instead support your children by providing a checklist on the back of the door and encourage them to get organised and pack their school bag the night before.

Check List: Before you leave home for school you should have: Books for the correct day Charged laptop TPHS Hat PE Uniforms – if needed Hard shoes – if you have Science or Technology (on a sports or mufti day) Equipment – calculator, protractor, coloured pencils, pens, pencils, apron, BAD, etc Lunch Permission Notes due Homework and Assignments due

1 NOT ALL STRESS IS BAD

While it's often given a bad rap, the right amount of stress can actually motivate you to get stuff done. The key thing is to recognise when stress has tipped over from being a motivating force to an overwhelming emotion.



2 20-MINUTE STUDY RULE

No one can study for six hours straight and be effective. Break up your time into twenty -minute chunks for the most effective use of your brain.





SAY IT **OUT LOUD**

The best way to really remember and learn is to talk about what you're learning out loud, without using any notes.

BREAKS = GOOD, CONSTANT DISTRACTION = BAD

Taking planned and timed breaks will help you remain on task, but checking your social every 5 minutes is a sure-fire study fail. Research shows that it can take up to twenty minutes to refocus on your task once you've been distracted.
