Bula and Vinaka!

I have just returned from 12 days in Fiji. Bula is the term for Hello - but it is wishing someone life and all the positive qualities that go with life, it is so much more than just 'Hi'. I went with a party of 8 including my sons, nephew and their two partners. Many thanks to Mr Laird and the team who looked after our school in my absence.

We experienced the summer we have not had in Australia - it was hot and very humid! We did a four-day Captain Cook Cruise which saw us snorkel twice a day and visit remote and secluded beaches and villages.

One of the stops was the school of Ratu Namasi. It has only 32 students at the School which ranges from Year 1 to Year 9 and services 3 local villages.







On our arrival the students sang to us in beautiful four-part harmonies. The students were so proud of their school and the work that they completed. They start at 7.30am each day and work until 3:00pm, some travelling a long way to get to school.

The photo here shows my guide Sami and his younger brother in his school uniform. Sami was the lead vocalist and is currently in Year 8. At the end of Year 9, students must leave their villages and go to the towns to continue their education. It is an expensive exercise for families and one every student does not have the opportunity to achieve. Sami's comprehension work in English was outstanding, the books they were working from were threadbare and they did not have their own desks, let alone air conditioning or fly screens. It was a wonderful opportunity to see the enthusiasm of the students who had so little and were so privileged to be learning. We also went to a more remote village where one male from every family must remain in the village to be farmers while the others may leave to seek occupations in the larger towns.

Staff Development Day

On Staff Development Day TPHS teachers undertook professional learning in Choice theory and EAL/D. The Choice Theory segment highlighted the language used to negotiate student through important choices they make every day. Some of these clips and exercises will be presented to the P&C next Monday evening 9 May at 7.15pm. The next session was on catering for the needs of students, with English as an Additional Language and Dialect. So many resources to support students have been provided by our EAL/D team. We look forward to continuing to upskill teachers on additional ways to support students in their learning journey. The final session was determined by each KLA/ faculty specific to the learning needs arising for each group.

In 1946 the CBCA established annual book awards to promote books of high literary and artistic quality. These awards are now the most influential and highly respected in Australia.

Each year, across Australia, the CBCA brings children and books together celebrating CBCA Book Week. Throughout the year, the CBCA works in partnership with authors, illustrators, publishers, booksellers and other organisations in the children's book world to bring words, images and stories into the hearts and minds of children and adults.

Australian children's literature enriches our nation and reaches children across the world through international editions.


