Welcoming overseas visitors

In Term 1 this year, The Ponds High School had 10 visiting Japanese students with us experiencing life in Australia, and at The Ponds. This was our first visit since Covid, so a first visit experience for many of our TPHS students. We were very grateful to the ten TPHS families that hosted these students in their homes for the week. Students participated in EAL/D lessons each morning, cultural lessons, and class activities with their buddies. They also attended a Year 12 Japanese lesson, where our Year 12 students had the opportunity to practise their Japanese, and all students were able to learn about each other's culture. During the week, the students had many experiences with their host families and new friends at The Ponds.

Competition success

Daniel D of Year 11 participated in the NSW Japanese Language Speech Contest, which was held at The University of NSW. He competed against Year 11 and 12 students from across NSW in the High School Senior Division. The subject, content and form of the speeches was left open to each contestant. Daniel presented a very successful speech, and he achieved 3rd place. This year we also had a number of students enter the ALC Japanese Competition. Our students received many awards including high distinctions, distinctions, and credits.

Year 7 students participated in the Sushi Incursion. Chef Dekura, a very experienced Sushi chef, came to The Ponds to demonstrate and teach students how to make flower rolls and inside-out rolls. Chef Dekura

has been visiting The Ponds every year since 2015. Students enjoyed watching the demonstrations and were able to create their own sushi rolls which they later enjoyed eating. They also watched demonstrations on how to creatively carve vegetables to create beautiful garnishes for their dishes.



STEM week organised for over 800 students in Week 9 of Term 4, completing a paper - based F1 in Schools Program, as well as numerous other activities from friction and forces experiments, balloon drop challenge, and investigating aerodynamics in a wind tunnel.

Successful integration of a plotter purchased for TAS by the P&C into Stage 5 and Stage 6 Design and Technology.

Successful integration of a new router table to improve Stage 6 major works, resulting in significantly better joints and finishing in timber.

Annex dust extractor upgrade and new extractor added to improve air quality and safety for teachers and students.

Upgrade of kitchen facilities, including one fridge and freezer, to accommodate the increase in practical lessons.

Build a Bridge Program completed by 36 students across all year groups, with great success.

Discover Engineering Program, including industry links with 'Cool Aeronautics', 'CSIRO' and 'Engineers Australia', involving 42 students.

The new Stage 5 Elective Philosophy course was run for the first time in 2023, with a full class and a waiting list. Writing and resourcing the course meant that a lot of interesting conversations were had in the staff room, which provided a good challenge for the English team. We look forward to further refining the program next year with the next group of students.

Blacktown Girls Model UN Conference 2023

On Sunday, November 5, a group of committed TPHS students with the oversight of Ms de Jesus, applied and were accepted into the very first Blacktown Girls Model UN Conference 2023 (BGMUN).

Depending on the students' level of MUN experience, they each were allocated into one of the corresponding UN committees, SOCHUM (Social, Humanitarian, and Cultural Committee), and ECOSOC (Economic and Social Council). Delegates worked in pairs, with each committee sophisticatedly debating an assigned topic in the form of one seen, and two unseen resolution papers, with the goal to create a holistic, agreed upon final resolution. Students were encouraged to briefly research their country's stance on various policy issues such as climate refugees, and military coups d'État in sub-saharan Africa. Furthermore, students actively engaged in the final general assembly, a combined debate with both committees on communism vs capitalism.

As the conference progressed, the delegates passionately engaged in debates and negotiations. With well researched arguments and eloquent speeches, they articulated their countries' positions while collaborating with others to draft resolutions. Each TPHS delegate grew in confidence as they addressed the assembly and defended their countries' stances. During the conference, each delegates performance and contributions were evaluated based on specific judging criteria. This criteria was used to assess each individual's understanding of the issues presented, diplomatic skills, public speaking, respect and professionalism, and overall engagement. An animated moderated caucus broke out between the delegates of North Korea, and Tunisia, whose conflicting ideologies created a tense atmosphere, but gave each participant experience in continuing diplomacy even under duress.

Each TPHS student should be commended for displaying invaluable skills that will continue to aid them in their future endeavor's, and professional success. The awards ceremony saw this success inevitably granted. Specifically, through the consistently mild - mannered, and well-spoken efforts of Vivian (Year 11), as she was granted the awards for the best-spoken delegate in her ECOSOC committee. A special congratulations to Anoushay (Year 10), who persevered as an individual delegate, and gained recognition by also being awarded best speaker in the SOCHUM committee. We are incredibly proud of their achievements and look forward to their continued success.

We are excited about witnessing our students seize this experience and evolve into empathetic, knowledgeable, and proficient global citizens.

For new SSTS School Opal card applications, students, parents or guardians will need to nominate Busways R1 Pty Ltd as their bus operator.



Overnight = 1 day ban Over the weekend = 1 week ban



Any lost or damaged library equipment including laptops, chargers and headphones will incur a replacement fee. To avoid this, please use all devices safely and in a respectful manner.






